## **SERMON-BASED STUDY: O HOLY NIGHT**

Lamentations 3:16-24, ESV – 16 He has made my teeth grind on gravel, and made me cower in ashes; <sup>17</sup> my soul is bereft of peace; I have forgotten what happiness is; <sup>18</sup> so I say, "My endurance has perished; so has my hope from the LORD." <sup>19</sup> Remember my affliction and my wanderings, the wormwood and the gall! <sup>20</sup> My soul continually remembers it and is bowed down within me. <sup>21</sup> But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: <sup>22</sup> The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; <sup>23</sup> they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. <sup>24</sup> "The LORD is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him." ## **ENGAGE WITH THE MESSAGE**



This week we were reminded that the world is always weary. What does it mean for the world to be weary?

## **DIGGING DEEPER**

John 3:16-21, ESV – <sup>16</sup> "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. <sup>17</sup> For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. <sup>18</sup> Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. <sup>19</sup> And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. <sup>20</sup> For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed. <sup>21</sup> But whoever does what is true comes to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that his works have been carried out in God."

- Looking at the passage above, what does this tell us about God and His love toward people?
- Verse 17 tells us that God sent His Son to save the world. How do people need to respond to this gift? Why is this important for having a relationship with God?
- How does the gift of love that God gave us through Jesus give us hope in the midst of trials and tribulations?
- **Hebrews 10:23, ESV <sup>23</sup>** Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful.

**Psalm 40:11-12, ESV** – <sup>11</sup> As for you, O LORD, you will not restrain your mercy from me; your steadfast love and your faithfulness will ever preserve me! <sup>12</sup> For evils have encompassed me beyond number; my iniquities have overtaken me, and I cannot see; they are more than the hairs of my head; my heart fails me.
